

Next week on Wednesday you will receive your child's report for terms 1 and .

2. Teachers spend a great amount of time considering a range of assessments

of students and then write about each child as an individual. When you receive your child's report it is important to think about the conversations you have with your child about learning. These conversations will influence your child's future attitude to their learning. Does your child have a fixed mindset ie that their intelligence is fixed (they are clever or not) or a growth mindset?

Here are some tips for promoting a growth mindset with children:

- Help children understand that the brain works like a muscle that can only grow through hard work, determination, and lots and lots of practice.
- Don't tell students they are smart, gifted, or talented, since this implies that they were born with the knowledge and does not encourage effort and growth.
- Let children know when they demonstrate a growth mindset.
- Praise the process. It's effort, hard work, and practice that allow children to achieve their true potential.
- Don't over praise the results. Test scores and rigid ways of measuring learning and knowledge limit the growth that would otherwise be tapped.
- Embrace failures and mistakes. Children sometimes learn the most when they fail. Let them know that mistakes are a big part of the learning process. There is nothing like the feeling of struggling through a very difficult problem, only to finally break through and solve it! The harder the problem, the more satisfying it is to find the solution.
  - Encourage participation and collaborative group learning. Children learn best when they are

#### ST MORRIS UNIT NEWS

A big thank you to Forsters Landscape Supplies who have kindly donated top soil to our raised garden beds that needed refreshing. This mean we can start planting again. During the next few weeks the students and staff will be visiting the local nursery to buy some winter seedlings and herbs to plant. Hopefully once grown we will be able to use the produce in our weekly cooking activities.

We are very fortunate to have two Occupational Therapist students (Emma and Haruka) from Uni SA working in the unit as part of their studies. They are undertaking work on a special project for us, that will run over 10 weeks. The project is to redevelop our Sensory Room and to give the entrance to the Unit a face lift. Emma and Haruka approached the Rotary Club of St Peter's to help financially and they have generously donated \$5000 for the redevelopment of the sensory room and the entrance to the unit. The sensory room will assist our students with opportunities to explore their senses and also as a calming space where students can feel safe and comfortable.

The project involves determining what equipment and resources are required to redevelop the sensory room, then sourcing them with the funding from the St Peter's Rotary Club and setting them up in the room provided by the school. The sensory needs and preferences of each child will be determined with Peason's Child Sensory Profile2 $^{\text{TM}}$  and used to write specific recommendations for use of the sensory room components by each child.
